Light House

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Who are we?

Light House is a well reputed non-profit voluntary development organization working for the development of rural and urban asset less poor, marginalized and high risk population particularly the landless, homeless, sex worker, drug users both injecting and heroin smokers, men who have sex with men (MSM) and Hijra with transgender, distressed, school dropouts, child labor, *Adibashi* and other disadvantaged adults and children in Bangladesh.

It is a leading Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) in Bangladesh that was founded in 1988 following devastating and gigantic Flood. Feeling concern, a group of young and energetic men joined together to work for the flood victims. One of those members, **Md Harun-or-Rashid** is now the Chief Executive of Light House. Gradually it becomes able to achieve people's trusteeship, transparency within the working areas keeping up better relationship with civil society, district and upazilla level administration and local government. At present, Light House is working in 23 districts of 5 divisions of Bangladesh.

House believes in making a difference through accountability, peace, harmony, gender equity & participation.

Light House has initiated a multi-dimensional project in Hard-to-Reach Areas of Rural Bangladesh with the financial support of well-known donors. The project is targeted to accelerate the achievement of the MDGs including SDGs as well as national target with respect to the access to public health, community legal service, improve justice, increase food security & awareness build up about the natural disaster & adaptation-mitigation etc. The aims of the overall projects are to promote decentralized and sustainable facilities through increasing the capacity of the hard-to-reach marginalized community and creating their access to basic health services, public health (HIV/AIDS prevention) awareness, to ensure community legal service and improve justice (Human rights & Good Governance) services, to increase food security for poverty reduction, to concern about the disaster risk & reduction for the excluded or deprived people in the vulnerable area.

Vision: A society, where all the people, irrespective of their ethnicity, age, economic status and sexual identity, can enjoy a healthy life with dignity.

The Mission of Light House is to serve the socially and economically less privileged people in Bangladesh, who are deprived of health care facilities, nutrition and income generating opportunities, justice; governance, and are vulnerable to climate change effects. The organization works with both supply

and demand sides, emphasizing on capacity building and facilitating accessibility to and availability of required services and products.

Objectives

Light House is committed to strengthening governance systems including access to justice of marginal population. The organization too pursues the need to improving and developing its services to empower our target groups. We are also committed to working towards the fight against HIV/AIDS to prevent the epidemic in Bangladesh

Goals

- Ensuring social security and justice at local & regional level.
- Improving the socio-economic conditions of poor, marginalized and vulnerable people and thereby decrease the number of people living in or below the poverty line.

- To increase self sustaining activities/ self sustainability of Light House


Legal Status

Light House has been awarded for implementing the UPHCSDP-II project in Rangpur City by Partnership Agreement with the Rangpur City Corporation from August 2019. Its purposes are to improve the health of urban poor by improving access to the healthcare services, and changing the ways through which health services are provided in the urban areas. Its aim is to improve the reproductive, maternal, neonatal and child health & nutritional status; to reduce vulnerability to the communicable diseases; to combat the non-communicable diseases; and to enhance the quality of life of the target population who are living in urban setting. The project Service delivery model to utilizes frontline health workers and health centres, connecting them with the public health facilities to improve access, coverage and quality of health services at both individual and at community level. Light House UPHCSDP-II project is working in Rangpur City Corporation covering the 15 wards (16-30 no. Ward) through 4 Static clinics (CRHCC-1, PHCC-3) and 36 Satellite Clinics. A total 85 staffs were actively working this project. The components of this project include comprehensive reproductive health care services, Family Planning services, Adolescent Reproductive health care, Child health care, Limited curative care, Communicable disease control, STI/RTI prevention program, Violence against women, Tuberculosis control program, primary eye care services, Medicine distribution, Education on health awareness, counselling, provision of clinical and pathological services, disease identification through pathological test, provide treatment or refer for better services. Other Initiatives

MFP (Micro Finance Program): Light House has been working on Micro Finance from the viewpoint of social business to assist the small-scale entrepreneurs to grow and nursing their own thoughts and initiatives on their own. Light House has started the program in 01st, September-2014 at 04 Unions of Kahaloo Upazila under Bogra district, 06 Unions of Rangpur Sadar & Kawnia Upazila under Rangpur district and 3 Unions of Chilmari Upazila of Kurigram district using the organization's own source of funding. Light House has been implementing Income Generation Activities (IGA) in order to empower landless and disadvantaged poor villagers, especially women in both urban and rural areas. We provide assistance to the beneficiaries for promoting income generating activities. At present Light House is implementing the program by forming 177 women groups, where the numbers of members are 3,591. Till now, the loan outstanding of Light House is 65,790,815/-BDT (Principal) and the loan recipients are 2,923. On the other hand, the members of the micro finance program deposited their savings of Tk 15,842,897/-. For verification of the use of loan in the proper trade/project regularly by Light House, the recovery rate has been 98% and also the group members have been benefited.

Light House School of Learning and Diversity: In early 2016, Light House took initiative to establish "Light House School of Learning and Diversity" with a view to provide modern technology based and scientific education for rural students of west Bogra. "Light House School for Learning and Diversity" is situated 6 km from Bogra town at Muruil of Kahaloo Upazila. The foundation stone of School laid by eminent writer and novelist Selina Hussain and an Ekushe medal laureate Palan Sarkar.

The main purposes of school are to create opportunity for rural and grass-root students and patronize meritorious students, provide quality education and create opportunity for learning and diversity and ensure access of rural student to an inclusive and equitable quality education to become a complete and competent human being. In January 2023, this school has been started with 120 students up to class X.

Treatment, Research and Rehabilitation Centre (TRRC) for Drug Users is Light House's initiative to provide detoxification, treatment and rehabilitation. It has received technical support from BARACA to make the initiative sustainable. TRRC aims to provide individualized quality treatment services to assist clients in becoming drug free along with life skills and psychosocial support through counseling, integrated method of therapeutic and 12 steps of Narcotics Anonymous (NA).

Rohingya Humanitarian Response: Following the Rohingya refugee influx, Light House has taken strategic decisions to move forward to getting engaged to address multi-faceted challenges of the refugees as well as the host communities in Ukhiya, Teknaf and Cox's Bazar sub-districts under Cox's Bazar district. With funding supports of UNHCR and Global Fund/Save the Children and leveraging internal funding sources, it has taken initiative to protect the most at risk women and girls from trafficking, sexual and gender-based violence. It has been able to establish 5 comprehensive services centers at Ukhiya, Leda of Teknaf, Teknaf Sadar and Cox's Bazar sadar where MHPSS counselling for GBV victims, legal supports and health treatment supports are being provided for both host and refugees communities. Light House has established a Safe Home for GBV and trafficking victims and has been able to support 130 GBV and VoTs in 2019. Light House is an active member of Anti Trafficking Working Group and other sectors led by ISCG. It has submitted funding appeal for protection activities in the Joint Response Plan 2020. As part of unique approach, Light House has registered 4550 most at risk women, girls and adolescent girls and offers protective services through linkages, advocacy and social networking. It has plan to establish another safe home in Ukhiya for victim support.

Disaster preparedness and Capacity Development of DMC: Light House considered preparedness for the disasters is essential for sustainable livelihood of the community people. It organizes training and workshop on disaster management in the disaster porn Bogra, Jaipurhat, Natore, Sirajganj, Pabna, Gaibanda.

Beside those, Light House organized training for young volunteer and DMC members in the working areas for disaster preparedness and recovery issues. Light House trained the community people, CBOs, local leaders, school teachers and others. Facilitate in establishing early warning centers, organize meeting, seminar and workshops on climate change and disaster risk reduction and Facilitate developing risk and resource mapping.

Management Structure:

A four-tier management structure comprising project staff, policy staff, the Light House Executive Committee and stakeholders enables the organization to run its programs smoothly:

• To ensure the participation of different segments of society, a 29-person General Committee has been established. This committee includes male and female policy makers and representatives from marginal groups. This committee meets once a year.

- The Light House Executive Committee comprises seven members, who are elected in annual general meeting for three years. This committee meets every three months or as and when necessary to take policy decisions.
- A senior management team (central management committee) consists of all departmental heads, project heads and senior officers headed by chief executive are working to oversee Program implementation.

Senior management team

This team has been consisting under the leader of Chief Executive, the Deputy chief executive, Director - Health, HIV AIDS & Nutrition, Director HRM and Admin, Director Finance, Deputy Director (Planning, Monitoring and Evaluation), Team Leaders, M & E Specialist, Training and Advocacy Specialist, Finance Specialist, Project Managers-, Project Coordinators, Internal Auditor and a female staff who represent all women staff of the organization.

Monitoring & Evaluation: The organization has a separate M&E unit headed by the Deputy Director-Monitoring and Evaluation, who is responsible to coordinate among the project heads working under the organization. Besides, it has developed and designed M&E software for track indicators wise achievement where the project data will also be uploaded and analysed.

There are several M&E Specialist and M&E officer working under different projects are assigned to submit the project M&E reports to Director-M&E for review and comments. The Deputy Director -M&E, after adding his inputs, submits it to the management for information and necessary action. The project personnel do monitor as described in the project M&E plan and submits reports to Director-M&E for review and comments. Based on the approval, the reports disseminate to project level for addressing the recommendations. Besides monitoring visit, regular supervision, on the job training also takes place as well as distance monitoring through phone/email added in the M&E system of Light House. However, Light House has been following the process of participatory monitoring at all level during the entire implementation period of the project.

Project Program Personnel: The respective Project focal persons and project coordinators responsible for ensuring adequate and appropriate monitoring of project activities. Light House monitoring activities include quarterly or semi-annual field visits as described in the project proposal. During these visits, they visit the intervention sites to gain updates on the progress of the project, observe direct service provision and training activities, attend meetings with stakeholders, and provide technical assistance both in technical areas and overall program development. Beside the monitoring activities also includes identifying success stories and innovative implementation ideas to replicate other sites. If they identify needs for specific technical assistance, they coordinate this with the appropriate project staff or relevant core team member of the organization. The results of these trips are documented in trip reports and these are shared with Senior Management during regular weekly and monthly meetings based on the importance of the findings.

Technical Team (M&E and Clinical services): Relevant technical staff makes regular visits to the project (a schedule of technical visits developed at the beginning of the project). During these visits, they use to provide training, review documentation, participate in quality assessments, observe activities and analyze data contained in monthly and quarterly reports. The M&E Specialist/M&E Officers will provide feedback as well as hands-on training to the field level staff. Debriefings with the project managers and site managers will also be a part of quality improvement initiative from technical units.

Senior Management Team (SMT) meets monthly to discuss major issues and takes decision for the betterment of the employees, projects and organizations. Besides SMT, project management team meets once months as part of project coordination meeting where all project heads present their achievement, failures and discusses challenges and its overcome strategies as well as best practices.

There are two ways of evaluation/ assessment of the project exists in the Light House Culture. In some project there is provision for conducting midterm and final evaluation. Which sometimes done by the donor according to the provision of contract. In some cases, it is being done by the organization and

submits report to the donor. So to conduct evaluation Light House follow the provision of the contract made with the funding agencies. In case of evaluation to be done by the organization, M&E department is assigned to carry out all about the evaluation process and prepare report to transmit to the donor for their suggestions and comments. Based on the findings, appropriate actions are taken. The suggestions and comments made by the donor are taken into consideration while restructuring/extension of the project. The annual reports are submitted to the donor according the provision of contract. However, it is done quarterly, half yearly and annually based on requirements. Financial reports are also submitting following the same process.

Management and HR& Admin: This division is headed by the Director-Finance who works under direct supervision of Chief Executive. Light House has rigidly followed the organization's constitution in governing the organization. The organization has developed different policies and manuals. All these have been approved by the management and we strongly follow the policies, rules and regulations of these manuals / policies. We try to maintain gender balance at organizational level and priority is given to the women. The performance of the staff is appraised annually and action taken accordingly.

Light House has a good number of professional staff working in different projects and in head office. They are acquainted with their duties & responsibilities. Necessary capacity building trainings are provided to the staffs to build up an efficient team. The Director Finance, look after the HR & Administration and responsible to conduct staff appraisal and other administrative aspect of all staff of the organization. He is reportable to the Chief Executive.

Financial Management: Finance section is headed by Director Finance and supported by the Finance Specialist, Officers and Assistants who manage the financial aspects of the organization. The organization has been successfully dealing with the financial aspects of different donors. An external audit firm audited the financial statements of the organization in each year and the reports are available. Light House has developed a standard financial manual with the cooperation of professional detailing financial procedures to be followed for keeping accounts properly. The accounts of the organization are maintained in proper manner following the rules of the manual. There is a team of efficient personnel to manage and control financial transactions. Computerized accounting system and software is being maintained at head office. Trial balance, income and expenditure statements and the balance sheet are being prepared through computerized accounting system.

Operation of Bank Account: Every office and project maintain separate bank accounts for financial transactions. The project heads and Chief Executive jointly operate these accounts according to the financial manual. Any amount of cash in hand beyond the ceiling amount is strongly discouraged.

Auditing and Internal control system: The accounts of the organization are audited every year by Chartered Accounting Firms and the report is placed before in the annual general meeting as the management is accountable to the general committee. We try our utmost to keep the financial management transparent to all parties concerned. The internal financial control system has been established in the organization. An internal audit team headed by Internal Auditor is doing the task. He is directly responsible to the Chief Executive. All the projects' accounts and other accounts running under the organization are audited by the Internal Audit team and reports submitted to the Chief Executive for proper initiatives. The General committee selects a chartered accountant firm for auditing the accounts of the organization every year. Executive committee proposes a panel of auditing firms in the AGM to select

a firm. The financial status of Light House as on December 31, 2019 reflects from the Balance Sheet placed below in the financial section.


